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Birding EcoTour to Ecuador

This will be an 8 day birding tour starting in Quito, Ecuador and staying on the Reserva Las Grialarias for 7 days. It would include birding on the north side of Rucu Pichincha, an extinct volcano, to the very birdy area of Reserva Yanachocha which is the site of the rare Ecuadorian endemic hummingbird and the Black breasted Puffleg. It would start at the watershed of the Mindo River to allow looks at many hummingbird species, including the amazing Sword-billed Hummingbird and the elegant Great Sapphirewing, as well as other elevation birds such as Tawny Antpitta and Hooded Mountain-Tanager.

We would spend the time at Reserva Las Raliaria, a cloud forest reserve for specialties including Cloud forest Pygmy Owl, Scaly-naped Amazon, Red-billed Parrot, Dark-backed Wood-Quail, and many more.

It would also cover the lower section of the Amazon for owls, nightjars and potoos. We would then head upslope and bird the lower part of the old Nono-Mindo Road to Bellavista Tandayapa area. Co-Parenting Tips

My daughter's father and I have never been married, but he's always been somewhat involved in her upbringing. We don't get along, though, and sometimes I wish he would just stay away. How can I get him to be more cooperative?

Co-parenting is not always easy even for married couples, but it can get very complicated for parents who divorce or who have never been married to begin with.

However, you may get more traction if you stop focusing on your co-parent's lack of cooperation, and instead focus on better ways to communicate with him and by learning to "let go" on certain issues.

This is not only important for your own well-being, but it's extremely important for your child. Continual outward conflict between parents, married or not, can be a cause of major stress for children. You may see this stress manifest itself in behavior problems, failure at school, depression, delinquency, substance abuse, or worse.

A six-page fact sheet from University of New Hampshire Cooperative Extension offers detailed guidance on co-parenting that may be helpful in your situation. Titled "Co-Parenting After Divorce," it's available online by going to <http://extension.unh.edu/resources/> and clicking on "Families and Parenting." The fact sheet offers guidelines to help you and your co-parent discuss what aspects of parenting to share, which decisions will be yours alone, and which decisions will be his alone.

This may be a very difficult conversation to have, but it's a critical conversation for your child's sake. Start by trying to find common ground on at least a few important issues. In the process, try to keep these recommendations in mind:

Don't argue or discuss parenting issues when your daughter is present.

Never place your child in the middle of a conflict or ask her to pass messages between you and your co-parent.

Never criticize or make negative comments about your co-parent, even in jest, in front of your child.

Try to provide consistent rules no matter which parent the child is with. If you and your co-parent can't agree, help your daughter understand that different situations often have different rules but always should be obeyed.

Treat your daughter's father as an equal. Refrain from preaching, and do your best to negotiate or compromise.

Even with all this guidance, it will take both of you to make co-parenting work. If your co-parent doesn't cooperate, don't give up. Just keep doing what you can to make the situation better and keep the door open for him to follow suit.

Lunch Bunch Program

Area companies and organizations can help the homebound by encouraging their employees to volunteer their time for a worthy cause.

Meals On Wheels of Stark & Wayne Counties recently established the "Lunch Bunch" program, through which businesses and organizations in the two-county region "adopt" a route and encourage employees to volunteer a lunch hour to deliver meals to homebound individuals who are nutritionally at-risk.

"Our agency, perhaps more than most not-for-profit organizations, is volunteer driven," said Teresa Barry, CEO. "We have 64 delivery routes to fill every weekday, making a total of 320 routes every week. Since most of our volunteers assist us once a week, we always have open routes to fill, and the support of area employers makes a huge difference in helping us fulfill our mission."

When an employer participates in the Lunch Bunch program, they agree to adopt a route and handle those deliveries, usually one day a week, throughout the year. Employees agree to help with the route on a rotating basis. Delivery routes begin just before 11 a.m. and last about an hour.

Employers already participating in the Lunch Bunch program include The Timken Company, AultCare and American Electric Power. Several churches, senior care centers and civic organizations also send volunteer teams to help on a weekly basis.

"The Lunch Bunch program not only ensures timely delivery of nutritious meals to those in need, it promotes team-building within participating companies and organizations," said Barry. "It also provides them with a unique way to give back to the community, and affords busy employees the opportunity to be active in community service without taking away precious evening and weekend time from their families."

"The focus of Meals On Wheels on nutrition for the homebound fits our mission," said Cassandra Thomas, associate vice president of community relations for

Agricultural Use Value Status

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Philharmonic Chorus presents "Elijah"

The Tuscarawas Philharmonic with the Philharmonic Chorus continues its 73rd season **Saturday evening, Feb. 7** with Mendelssohn's dramatic oratorio Elijah. Dover native Ronald Barkett will sing the title role. He will be joined by Mary Latsha, mezzo soprano, of Lima, Ohio and formerly of Dover; Joseph Taczak, tenor, of Canton; and Melanie Winn, soprano; of New Philadelphia.

Traditionally, an oratorio is a kind of sacred opera, usually based on a Biblical subject, but without costumes, scenery, movement, or lighting, in a concert presentation. As in an opera, there are named characters, solo arias and recitatives, choruses and instrumental pieces, and much drama. In the early 19th century, the sacred oratorio was popular in England, due largely to the continuing legacy of George Frederick Handel, whose most famous oratorio was "Messiah."

In Mendelssohn's day, opera was the most electrifying way to tell a story, linking a narrative with the power of musical language. Mendelssohn, in "Elijah," employs operatic techniques to depict the dramatic events in the story of the Hebrew prophet as he confronts corruption, unbelief and idolatry.

The plot and text are drawn mainly from the books of 1st and 2nd Kings and the narrative concerns five incidents in the story of Elijah found there. Mendelssohn organized the material in two parts. Due to limits of time, the Tuscarawas Philharmonic is not presenting the work in its entirety. Part One features the duel between Elijah and the prophets of Baal. Part Two tells of Elijah's isolation and despair when Ahab and Jezebel retaliate against him for his destruction of Baal worship. Elijah finds an answer to his complaint when he encounters the divine, not in a mighty wind or earthquake, but in "a still, small voice." He is ultimately vindicated and rescued when he is carried on a flaming chariot to heaven.

G. Randall Gibbs, tenor, and Joseph Palmer, bass, both of New Philadelphia will join Latsha and Winn in a solo quartet and Linda Yoder, of Fresno, and Carolyn Delphia, of Dover, will contribute solo recitatives. A trio ensemble comprised of Gloria Dillon, Michelle Hartz-Coutts, and Candice McMath, of New Philadelphia; Linda Yoder, of Fresno; Geneva Martin, of West Lafayette; and Juli Arnett, Kathy Blair, Sherri Weidman, and Denise Mathias, all of Dover and a quartet ensemble consisting of Roberta Myers, of Atwood, Carolyn Brodzinski, and Linda Angel Rice, of New Philadelphia, Beth Houze, of Bolivar; Sara King, of Fresno; Paula Fritz and Carolyn Delphia, of Dover; and Mary Rinella, of Sugarcreek, will also be drawn from the Philharmonic Chorus.

Sustainability Issues—Right Under Our Feet!

From food security to climate change to energy demands, the world faces a myriad of critical sustainability issues, all whose potential solution may lie right beneath our feet.

Rattan Lal, an Ohio State University soil scientist with the Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center, suggests that soil and its resources are the answer, and sustainability can be achieved through the realization of 10 basic management principles.

"We are dealing with 10 global issues at the moment: food security, availability of water, climate change, energy demand, waste disposal, extinction of biodiversity, soil degradation and desertification, poverty, political and ethnic instability, and rapid population increase. The solution to all of these lies in soil management," said Lal, with the School of Environment and Natural Resources. "It doesn't mean that agriculture is the only solution, but it plays a major role in addressing these issues."

Lal synthesized years of scientific literature on soil degradation and the positive impacts of restoration and developed 10 basic principles of sustainable soil management. The principles, published in the January/February 2009 issue of *Journal of Soil and Water Conservation*, as well as the journal *Agronomy for Sustainable Development*, are meant to encourage policymakers to support soil amendment practices.

"I'd like to see policymakers implement policies which will encourage the adoption of such practices as conservation agriculture, integrated nutrient management, crop rotation, agroforestry -- techniques that the scientific community knows would sustain soils and agricultural practices," said Lal.

Lal's principles of sustainable soil management are:

- Soil degradation is a biophysical process, but driven by social, economic and political forces. Minimizing degradation and enhancing restoration depends on addressing the human dimensions that drive land misuse.

- When people are suffering from poverty, they pass that suffering on to the land. The stewardship concept is important only when the basic needs are adequately met.

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- You cannot take more out of the soil than what you put in it without degrading its quality. Outputs must balance inputs, said Lal.

- Marginal soils cultivated with marginal inputs produce marginal yields and support marginal living.

- Plants cannot differentiate between organic and inorganic inputs therefore it is a matter of logistics in making nutrients available in sufficient quantity, in the appropriate form, and at the right time for optimum growth and yields.

- Mining carbon has the same effect on global warming, whether it is through extractive farming (tillage) or through the burning of fossil fuels.

- Soils can be a source of carbon extraction or a sink for carbon storage, depending on how the soil is managed. If used as a sink, the soil has the capacity to store three gigatons of carbon a year, translating into a reduction of 50 parts per million of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere over the next five decades.

- Even the most elite crop varieties developed through biotechnology and genetic engineering cannot extract water and nutrients from the soil where they do not exist. "This principle is very important. There are those who argue that genetically engineered varieties will solve production problems. Not necessarily true," said Lal. "Improvements can only be realized if crops are grown on well-managed soils."

- Improved soil management is the engine of economic development in rural communities, especially in developing countries.

- Traditional knowledge and modern innovations go hand-in-hand. One cannot solve current global issues without the other. "We can develop upon traditional knowledge, but those who ignore modern innovations must be prepared to endure more sufferings," said Lal.

Lal said he developed the soil management principles to draw attention to the United Nations Millennium Development Goals -- a commitment to solve and/or improve upon eight global issues by 2015. The issues include poverty and hunger, universal education, gender equality, child health, maternal health, HIV/AIDS, environmental sustainability and global partnerships.

"The UN defined these goals in 2000 and now we know that none of these goals will be met by 2015. Why? Because soil and agricultural management are not being addressed," said Lal. "If we do not address these issues now by paying more attention to how we can sustain the soil, then 20 years from now we will be talking about the very same things."
